In accordance with Association policy, regular communication will be provided to NLTA members by way of periodic updates on the status of the collective bargaining process. In the last update, we reported that opening proposals had been exchanged and confirmed the members of the negotiating teams for Government and the Association. There were no further talks on the Labrador West Collective Agreement while negotiations on the provincial contract were ongoing, but discussions resumed once a Provincial Tentative Agreement was reached in February 2019.

In April 2019, Government dropped the writ for the Provincial election and went into "caretaker mode", leaving negotiations temporarily on hold until the end of the election. However, there were several meetings with the negotiating team in May and June and there should be further updates in the near future.

In addition, the composition of Government's negotiating team has changed. Government's chief negotiator was previously George Joyce (Assistant Deputy Minister (Advisory Services Branch), Human Resource Secretariat). That position is now held by Sarah Anthony, Staff Relations Specialist, Executive Council (Human Resource Secretariat). As previously communicated, the members of the NLTA negotiating team for Labrador West are:
