PL Grant Funds in Action

2021 Winner – Kelly Harris

Thank you to the SIC for the 2021 grant. Anyone who knows me knows how much I love to win! I used the funds to access many of the items I needed to support the PL I had taken advantage of through speechpathology.com and Marie Stirling's work.

During 2020-21 and into 2022, I had really worked hard at the development of my personal AAC skills. I have spent a lot of time preparing materials to support AAC, coaching parents and teachers and working directly with the students. I used part of the grant to purchase the AAC Implementation Toolkit by Speechy Musings. It has been very helpful for me to use as a guide throughout the AAC process. It also had helpful tips for use with parents and staff. It presents the information in a way that is easy to follow.

I had decided that I needed to update my approach to working on Apraxia of Speech. Over the past few years there has been an increase in the number of students with severe speech needs. I used some of the money to purchase a large anatomical mouth teaching model. I use playdoh to make the tongue movements more visible. For the students, seeing the giant model has made a big difference, especially with the dreaded vocalic /r/ and lateral lisps.

I invested in a set of Recordable Buttons. Some of the students I have been seeing over the past few years are just beginning to understand cause and effect. These buttons have been a fun way to work on this early skill across a number of activities. Some of the speech kids like recording messages on them for fun. I also purchased the "vintage style" memory game – Simon. I use the game as a quick reinforcer. Plus, it is helpful in trying to explain the power of Rehearsal and Self-Talk in helping memory. Students LOVE this game!

I have spent considerable time over the last two years of RTL trying to come up with an easier system for IRT teachers and myself to target a

variety of language skills in an easier way in our limited time together. I have developed almost 20 "theme boxes" that contain children's books for the literacy tie in, vocabulary and phonological awareness. I have included various materials for grammar, listening, theme-related games and even reinforcers/manipulatives. To support this initiative, I used some of the funds to purchase **several children's books** to fit the themes. I purchased the *Sentence Shuffle Fun Deck* from Super Duper for grammar practice. I bought two different TPT items for general language, listening and articulation: Open Ended Mini **Object Scenes for Speech and Language** by Anna Dee SLP and One Page Picture Scenes for Speech and Language Therapy with Mixed Groups by Stace Crouse. I have printed the scenes related to the themes and have them in the boxes. IRTs love these picture scenes and are using them to tie in writing goals as well. I purchased a TPT Halloween WH Question with Visuals and Smash Mats by Anna Dee SLP. This little activity set was worth the money and I have since purchased more. I purchased the What's Wacky Fun Deck by Super Duper and added small sets of these into the boxes based on the themes. I purchased **Dry Erase Pockets** so that some materials could be slipped into the sleeves for easy cleaning and to cut down on copying and laminating. I also purchased new stickers for reinforcers and these are in the boxes based on the themes like St. Patrick's Day, spring, ocean, etc.

The last thing I purchased was the SLP Essentials Bundle from Speech Therapy Plans. I purchased this in an effort to organize myself. Honestly, this is a work in progress. I expect to set myself up using this over the summer.

Thank you again for the support. I had spent a considerable amount of time trying to improve my practice through various PL sessions over the past several years. The grant money allowed me to purchase the physical things I needed to put what I learned into my daily practice.
